Life Group Questions

This week, before you go to your Life Group:

Read Micah 5. Write down your observations and questions. Write down any verses or passages that don't make sense and bring them to the group

Life Group Discussion Questions:

Read Micah 5:1-6 together. Compare and contrast the descriptions of the current leadership with the anticipated 'shepherd.' What are the most striking differences? What about the shepherd gives you hope and a sense of excitement?

In Micah 5:10-15 there is a description of things that the Israelites depended on instead of God. List them and describe what they are. What are some of the common idols that exist in our culture?

Review the four ways to identify idols in our lives, found in the sermon notes. As you examine yourself using these questions, what do you think are the things in your life that you are tempted to treat as a false god?

Jesus claims to be the Shepherd King that God's people were waiting for. In Matthew 9, Jesus is moved to compassion because he sees helpless and harassed people. Skim this chapter and list the ways in which he provides and protects people. What does this say about what it means for Jesus to be king and how he shepherds his people?

Jesus quickly enlists his disciples to join him labouring in the harvest (caring for people) in Matthew 9:35-38. What do you think he's asking his disciples to do? How can you labour in the harvest this year at home, at church and in the community?
